La Mota Fortress (Walled City)

A Historical-Artistic Monument since 1931, it preserves the original city walls and is undoubtedly the best example of a medieval walled city. The best practices in the restoration of the complex earned it recognition by the Hispania Nostra awards in 2017.



Llanillo (street)

The historic centre of Alcalá la Real stands out due to the contrast between its institutional buildings' noble masonry and the elegant modernism of its private homes. Decorative plasterwork and ironwork, tiles and polychromy reflect the taste for regionalist modernism in the early twentieth century.

Las Cruces. Sunsets

Hill opposite La Mota, noteworthy due to its whitewashed houses, the narrowness of its streets and the crosses that mark its pathways. The sunset is a monument of special beauty from any viewpoint in this neighbourhood. At these tranquil, secluded locations, you will be able to contemplate the magnificent silhouette of the Fortress de La Mota (Walled City) with the city at its feet. An ephemeral and ever-changing spectacle.



City Hall Square

City Hall, built in 1733 and in baroque style, exhibits architectural features of great interest such as the mascarons in its arches, the griffins on the ironwork of the balcony, the coloured jasper of the doorway and the lunar clock, made by Fernando de Tapia, which has worked since 1803.



Abbey Palace

The façade of the Abbey Palace is an example of neoclassical architecture, with French and Italian influences, great originality in the mansards of its roof and the aileron-like curve of its central balcony bearing the shield of the abbot Esteban de Mendoza y Gatica and the year of construction, 1781. It houses the city museum, Hercules and the faun from the Roman era are noteworthy, as well as the treasure from the Caliphal period of the New Hermitage.



Pilar de los Alamos

Designed by Jacobo Florentino, this Renaissance work from 1552 contains the city shield with the caption "key, guardian, and defence of the Kingdoms of Castile", a title granted to the city by the Catholic Monarchs. Highlights include the high reliefs that represent two warriors and two griffins, mythological beings with guardian duties.

Compás de Consolación (Square)

This space is a transition between the north and south, the Calle Real and Llanillo (street), the Cerro de la Mota and Las Cruces; it is a place of pilgrimage to visit the patron saint, the Virgin of Las Mercedes, and enjoy the major city festivals. The Roman remains of the nearby Domus Herculana, in la Tejuela, remind us that we are in a place where past and present coexist.



Our landscape

The Alcalá landscape, despite resembling a sea of olive trees, is diverse and multifaceted. Countryside, hillside, riverbanks. Guarded by 12 watchtowers, symbol of a borderland, in our sixteen villages you will find corners and pathways where you can enjoy our tranquil atmosphere, and especially our welcoming neighbours who will make your stay an unforgettable experience.

Hiking trails

The **Trail of the Sumacs** runs along the edge of an interesting geological formation, Los Tajos, where the common kestrel lives and where the largest number of sumacs in the municipality is concentrated.

The **Velillos River path** runs along the banks of the river itself. The area of aspens and poplars where the nightingale, common blackbird and warbler nest is noteworthy.

The **GR-128 Villages Cycle Route** is a circular route of more than 92 km that allows us to learn about the geography, landscapes and populations in the municipality of Alcalá la Real.

The historic **Mozarabic Way of Santiago** unites the southern part of the peninsula with Santiago de Compostela, merging with the Via de la Plata, and it is one of the most important pilgrimage routes in the country.
